Announcing a \$6 Million Investment in Arts & Culture

At an event held in Bushnell Park on September 10, the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving announced a \$6 million investment in arts and culture over the next two years. This series of grants and investments — made as part of our Centennial anniversary — represents a comprehensive approach to launching the next century of creativity.

This Centennial Arts and Culture Investment includes \$4 million in onetime "Appreciation Grants" to 48 arts and culture organizations across 13 towns in the region. The Foundation aimed to provide close to 10 percent of the nonprofits' operating budget (with the exception of the largest organizations). See which organizations received grants.

Artists of Color Accelerate

In addition to our Appreciation Grants, we announced an investment of \$1 million to continue and deepen the Artists of Color Accelerate program, expanding opportunities for local creatives by connecting them as fellows with host arts organizations.

Assets for Artists

We've also committed \$460,000 to launch Greater Hartford Creatives Alliance, a professional development and grant program for independent creatives through a new partnerhsip with Assets for Artists. This program will provide artists with career guidance to strengthen financial sustainability, as well as community-building events to connect with peers. In the words of Hartford Foundation President and CEO Jay Williams, we want to get rid of the concept of the "starving artist."

Supporting Cultural and Historical Nonprofits

We are awarding \$400,000 to launch a new partnership with CT Humanities to offer a grant and capacity building program for smaller cultural nonprofits and historical societies. Participating organizations will be selected through an open application process in early 2026.

Announcement Event

The Hartford Art Tour



The Hartford Foundation for Public Giving and the City of Hartford have co-created the **Hartford Art Tour**, a free digital experience that allows residents to learn about murals and other public art throughout the city while they embark on their own self-guided tour.

The app includes more than 100 works of art. It features maps, artist bios, stories, photos, and audio/video content.

It's also a "digital passport" that allows users to check in when they visit an artwork in person, keeping track of everything they've seen.

This was a community effort. Several local organizations contributed to the content development including the Greater Hartford Arts Council, Wadsworth Atheneum, Bushnell Park Conservancy, Cedar Hill Cemetery, and Riverfront Recapture. The app features brand new photos and voices of some of the local artists.



100 Influencers of Greater Hartford: Sarada Nori

Sarada Nori is a dancer and choreographer skilled in the Southern Indian dance of Kuchipudi, which utilizes a mixture of rapid footwork, body movements, facial expressions, and even brass plates and musical jewelry to tell a story. With more than 20 years of Kuchipudi dance under her belt, Sarada created Layavinyasa, a local organization that builds bridges between people of different cultures and forges new paradigms using Indian art forms.

Sarada travels throughout New England, articulating dance and other forms of artistic expression to connect people with Indian culture. Her Layavinyasa ensemble has performed at public libraries, schools, religious spaces, and most notably, the International Festival of Arts & Ideas in New Haven.

Layavinyasa was one of the recipients of our Centennial Arts and Culture Investment grants.
