The story of our community is a complex one: it is filled with great hope and significant challenges. It is a story of inspirational change and widespread inequity. It is also one that's still largely unwritten, and now is the moment for meaningful change.

During our strategic planning process, we considered an array of information, from quantitative data to wide-ranging community conversations. One truth became clear: disparities based on race and ethnicity, ZIP code and income are persistent and widening. We also confirmed that talent is everywhere, but opportunity is not. As a leader in the region and a steward of our community's resources, we must do more to create transformative change. The Hartford Foundation is engaging in new ways with nonprofits, donors and other community stakeholders to make our region a place where all people have opportunities to thrive.

Over the past three years, the work of the Foundation has affected change across our community. We have invested in education, for our youngest children and for teenagers and young adults contemplating their next steps. We've helped create employment opportunities and job training for at-risk youth and returning citizens. And we sustained vibrant communities through support for the arts, investing in collaborations to end homelessness as well as launching a new community and economic development initiative.

Looking ahead, as we address the root causes of the disparities in our community, we will focus on outcomes that expand opportunities to the promising talent in our neighborhoods. We are instituting a rigorous research and evaluation practice within the Foundation to measure progress toward these outcomes. We are looking inward to ensure we are a high performing organization: with upgraded technology and a commitment that diversity, equity and inclusion are infused into everything we do.








We don't do this work alone. We will continue to rely upon the knowledge and efforts of our region's residents and nonprofits and the generosity of our donors to grow opportunity for all residents. So when you see us in your neighborhood, on social media, or wherever you are, please let us know what changes you envision for our community. Working together, the next chapters of Greater Hartford's story can be filled with stronger connections, inclusive opportunity and inspiring achievements.

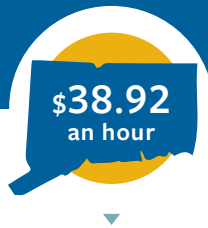


# We responded to needs throughout our community.

As a broad-based community foundation, we are presented with an array of needs across our community. Because of significant disparities in our region, an equal distribution of resources would not have resulted in equal outcomes. Instead, we prioritized the people and places with the most pressing needs.

## Helping Greater Hartford Residents Earn Livable Wages

The Hartford Foundation’s [Career Pathways Initiative](#) targets residents with limited literacy and employment skills who need a broad range of coordinated services to be successful.

The Career Pathways Initiative created nine partnerships among adult literacy, community college, workforce development, service and employment sectors to develop achievable personal improvements that lead to jobs with family-supporting wages.

## Supporting Student Achievement through Partnerships

In recognition of widely accepted research that schools alone cannot provide students with all of the support they need to be successful, the Hartford Foundation has worked with seven of the region's highest-need school districts to establish offices of **Family, School, Community Partnerships**.

These offices lead the effort to deepen school districts' relationships with families, as well as with municipal governments and nonprofit organizations in order to identify and respond to students' most significant challenges. These connections better prepare students for college and career success.

## Making Communities Stronger by Supporting Our Returning Residents

Each year, more than 2,500 women and men are released from a Connecticut correctional facility, halfway house or parole supervision, with more than half being brought to Hartford. The absence of adequate stabilizing resources immediately upon release jeopardizes their successful reintegration.

With a three-year grant from the Hartford Foundation, Community Partners in Action, the City of Hartford and a team of partners created a one-stop [Reentry Welcome Center](#) in Hartford to help returning citizens successfully reintegrate into their communities.

The Center helps returning citizens navigate the variety of available support and services, ranging from basic needs to job training, educational opportunities and substance abuse treatment. Assisting those returning to the community after serving time in prison reduces repeat criminal activity and makes communities safer.

## Three Decades Supporting Young Children and Their Families in Our Region

Since 1987, the Hartford Foundation has invested more than \$40 million in [Early Childhood Development](#) and family support. The Hartford Foundation has focused its early childhood work on aligning services, practices, policies and resources at the local, regional and state levels. Recognizing that commitment and care for children and families must happen at each of these levels in order to build and sustain a quality early childhood system, the Hartford Foundation has continued to support a broad range of work to support families with young children.

### Capital Region Alliance for Family Support and Empowerment (CRAFSE)

CRAFSE was created to provide a broad range of services to families in our region. Bringing together leaders and managers from these entities on a regular basis strengthens relationships, helping to remove organizational barriers and disciplinary silos.

### Family Childcare Network

We have acted to ensure that family childcare is part of policy discussions by state and local early childhood advocacy groups, and we have supported improving the quality of home care (most often used by underserved communities and newly-arrived families).

## Enhancing the Donor Experience

The Hartford Foundation's Donor-Advised Funds provide a centralized and efficient way to make charitable gifts. A donor-advised fund at the Hartford Foundation is a highly personal and flexible giving vehicle that allows donors the ability to recommend grants to any qualified charitable organization, at any time.

Over the past three years, the Hartford Foundation has redesigned its online Grants Express tool to offer donors hundreds of funding options to support community programs, quickly and easily. The Hartford Foundation also invited donors to participate in several educational sessions around topical areas of interest including immigration, access to education and mental health.



### Informed, engaged, intentional giving: The Aronson Family



Philanthropy and civic engagement are central to the Aronson family. Amanda and Scott intentionally plan both their volunteer and financial support of the community as they model their values for their children, instilling a sense of responsibility for the world in which they live. Establishing a donor-advised fund through the Hartford Foundation provides a basis for the Aronsons to invest meaningfully where they feel a strong impetus to give and to involve their children who have a say in how the funds are distributed.





## An Endowment Grounded in Trust: Hands On Hartford

Hands On Hartford is an invaluable social service organization helping to meet basic human needs of Hartford residents through programs that increase food security and nutrition, improve health and provide housing. The Hartford Foundation partners with Hands On Hartford on a number of their initiatives addressing growing disparities in innovative ways.

When Hands On Hartford recognized a need for long-term planning, they started the **Hands On Hartford Endowment Fund** at the Hartford Foundation to enhance their sustainability. Hands On Hartford's decision to establish their fund with us was based on trust and a common vision of the needs of the community. Most recently, Hands On Hartford opened an Innovation Fund to address emerging ideas, initiatives and programs.

## Engaging and Deepening Connections with the Community

The Board and staff of the Hartford Foundation continue to explore ways to engage members of our community in the work of philanthropy. Launched in 2016, the Hartford Foundation's **Board of Ambassadors** is a group of civic-minded and active members of the Greater Hartford community who meet to discuss emerging issues in the community and key initiatives in the Foundation.

Our Ambassadors help the Hartford Foundation develop new relationships and deepen our connections to residents to promote philanthropic efforts in the communities we serve.

The Hartford Foundation is fortunate to have three giving circles: **Catalyst Endowment Fund**, the **Latino Endowment Fund** and the **Black Giving Circle Fund**. While each group has its own leadership, members, processes and focus, all share one key objective: improving the quality of life in Greater Hartford through the power of participatory grantmaking.

Members of all three circles meet annually to share ideas, learn together and identify ways to collaborate.

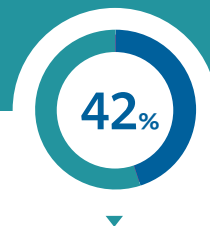

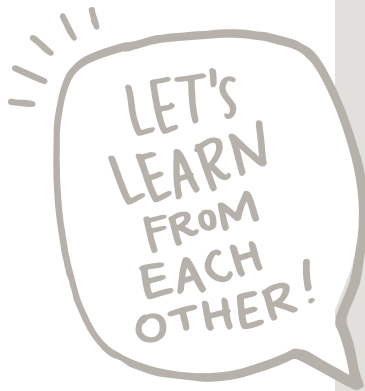

## Listening, Learning and Responding to Residents

Over a 16-month period, the Hartford Foundation [visited each of the 29 towns in our region](#) to hear residents' ideas about the ways the Hartford Foundation might partner and help—recognizing that residents know what is best for their communities. During our visits, the Hartford Foundation learned what people love about their towns and how they hope to make them even better places to live, work and raise a family. Among the recurring themes were the need for: more and younger volunteers; common gathering places that cross generations; and access to job training, public transportation and health care services.

Another common theme was a desire for increased resources and opportunities to meet with one another, share concerns and work together to develop common solutions.

These community conversations led the Hartford Foundation to make a \$2.9 million investment to create the [Greater Together Community Funds](#), announced in November 2018.



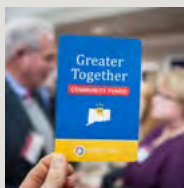
**\$2.9 million investment to create the Greater Together Community Funds**

## Creating Healthy Communities by Reducing Urban Violence and Trauma

Gun violence continues to grow in Hartford, with the highest concentrations in poorer neighborhoods. In the midst of this, five local nonprofit agencies and resident leaders created the [Hartford Community Safety Coalition](#). The members of the coalition represent those who have been the first responders to gun violence—working with families, residents, health providers and police to address trauma and violence prevention.

With a \$160,000 grant from the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving, the Coalition is conducting a variety of community activities, with a focus on youth engagement and leadership, to build a stronger, more cohesive Hartford.

## Increasing Equity and Empowering Resident Voices through Voting

In August 2018, the Hartford Foundation launched a nonpartisan [Get Out the Vote initiative](#) to reach residents in Greater Hartford communities that have historically low voter turnout.

The Hartford Foundation awarded thirteen grants to area nonprofits working to inform and engage these residents, which resulted in more than 1,000 new voters and 1,500 pledges to vote.

Employing the lessons learned through this effort, the Hartford Foundation is supporting similar efforts for 2019 municipal elections and the 2020 Census.









# We grew our influence with policy makers and improved our capacity.

As a high-performing organization, we are committed to growth and innovation through seasoned leadership. Investing in both external relationships and our internal organization, we are well-positioned to navigate the myriad of changes and challenges that can occur in a diverse region such as ours.

## Testimony to State Commission on Fiscal Stability and Economic Growth

Leading differently means recognizing that statewide disparities impede our local progress and can only be addressed through strategies that are collaborative, inclusive and equitable. The Hartford Foundation is using the power of our voice and the knowledge from our work to inform our state leaders on core issues and put forward potential solutions.

In February 2018, Hartford Foundation president Jay Williams submitted testimony and shared remarks with the state's **Commission on Fiscal Stability and Economic Growth**. He was one of the only voices speaking on behalf of Connecticut philanthropy and focused his comments on the preconditions required for creating and sustaining inclusive economic growth.

Guided by shared core values of equity and inclusion, we are committed to a Connecticut where all residents have an opportunity to thrive and contribute to the economic growth of the state. Only with a growing economy will our communities have the public resources necessary to support needed services.”

*As a follow-up to his testimony, Williams joined the CEOs of Fairfield County's Community Foundation, the Community Foundation for Greater New Haven and the Community Foundation of Eastern Connecticut to co-author an op-ed piece for the Connecticut Mirror. The article discussed how our state's community foundations are working together to create and advance Connecticut's urban centers as drivers of economic growth for all residents.*

## **Diversity, Equity and Inclusion**

While the Hartford Foundation seeks to address disparities in our community, we have begun work to improve our own internal culture and processes to be more responsive to issues around diversity, equity and inclusion.

**The Diversity-Equity-Inclusion (DEI) Advisory Group** is working to develop specific organizational goals and a work plan. The entire organization will be engaged in conversations and training as we build DEI into every facet of the Foundation's work. This effort is essential as we seek to grow as a high-performing organization and work to address disparities related to race / ethnicity, ZIP code and income in the region.



## Implemented New Technology



For more than two decades, the Hartford Foundation has relied on the FIMS software system to drive our operations. Once the Foundation outgrew the system's ability to effectively support our work, Foundation staff engaged in an extensive review of possible replacements before settling on **Foundant**.

Over the past year, the Foundation engaged in the process of learning the new system, customizing it to our needs, and transferring more than 90 years of information. While the formal transition is complete, our staff continues to learn how to make the most of this powerful new tool to meet the needs of our donors, grantees and staff.



## We've gathered insights. We're organized for impact. We're building the tools.

Over the years, we've learned how to better support our community through intentional listening, evaluation, and strengthening area nonprofits. We're using this learning to continually develop and refine the tools and processes designed to increase our effectiveness. Here are highlights of our best learning in practice:



### Convening Our Community

Throughout the year, we invite people to come together, listen, learn and discuss topics of common interest. In October 2017, the Foundation supported two community forums hosted by the City of Hartford that focused on the potential of municipal bankruptcy. Moderated by Foundation president Jay Williams, the forums featured panelists with firsthand knowledge of municipal bankruptcy.



### Building Nonprofit Capacity

Since the late 1980s the Foundation's [Nonprofit Support Program](#) (NSP) has been helping to strengthen nonprofit organizations by providing tools and knowledge for agencies to build strong boards, plan for their futures, evaluate programs, improve finances and update technology. In 2016, NSP staff launched the Foundation's [Small Agency Program](#), an initiative that provides general operating support and small project grants to assist Greater Hartford nonprofits with revenues below \$200,000.



## Research and Evaluation to Support Informed Decision-making and Strategy

Over the past several years, the Foundation has worked to expand its capacity to collect data, support research and promote high-quality evaluation practices. The Foundation's new Research and Evaluation unit works to gauge progress and assess outcomes of programs and initiatives, and inform the Foundation's strategies and operations.

The Foundation has produced and commissioned research on a variety of issues including the Connecticut Wellbeing Survey, the Hartford Region Hurricane Displacement Survey, a report on K-12 regionalization, and a plan for the creation of the Greater Hartford Reentry Welcome Center.



## Raising the Voice of Philanthropy in Public Policy

The Hartford Foundation recognizes the power of public policy. By engaging in a broad range of public policy activities, our grantmaking can be more far-reaching, sustainable and responsive. These activities include sharing information, convening diverse voices around a particular issue, forming strategic relationships and advocacy. For example, the Foundation has collaborated with state and local policymakers to support the region's returning citizens and home-based child care providers.

## Catalyzing Community and Economic Development

**HFPG Impact! Greater Hartford** seeks to ignite investments in community and economic development in ways that lift up all residents and maximize the region's inclusive economic growth and quality of life. As a wholly owned subsidiary, HFPG Impact! puts a greater portion of the Foundation's assets to work and provides the Foundation extensive flexibility to invest beyond our traditional grantmaking.

## What's Next: A new strategic approach— a determined, organization- wide commitment.



In the pursuit of more opportunities for everyone in the region, we are working in partnerships to remove persistent disparities where we know them to be most pronounced.

Through listening to our stakeholders, engaging in the community and our own research and assessment, it has become clear that Greater Hartford must achieve more racial, geographic and economic inclusion to fulfill its potential as a vibrant, thriving and leading force for statewide and regional prosperity.



## Race, Place + Income

Our commitment to creating opportunities for all in Greater Hartford will address disparities by race / ethnicity, place (ZIP code) and income.



These disparities result from decades of systemic factors, structural racism and disinvestment in many of our communities.

**In our region, children from low-income White households move up the economic ladder at twice the rate as children from low-income Black and Latinx households.**

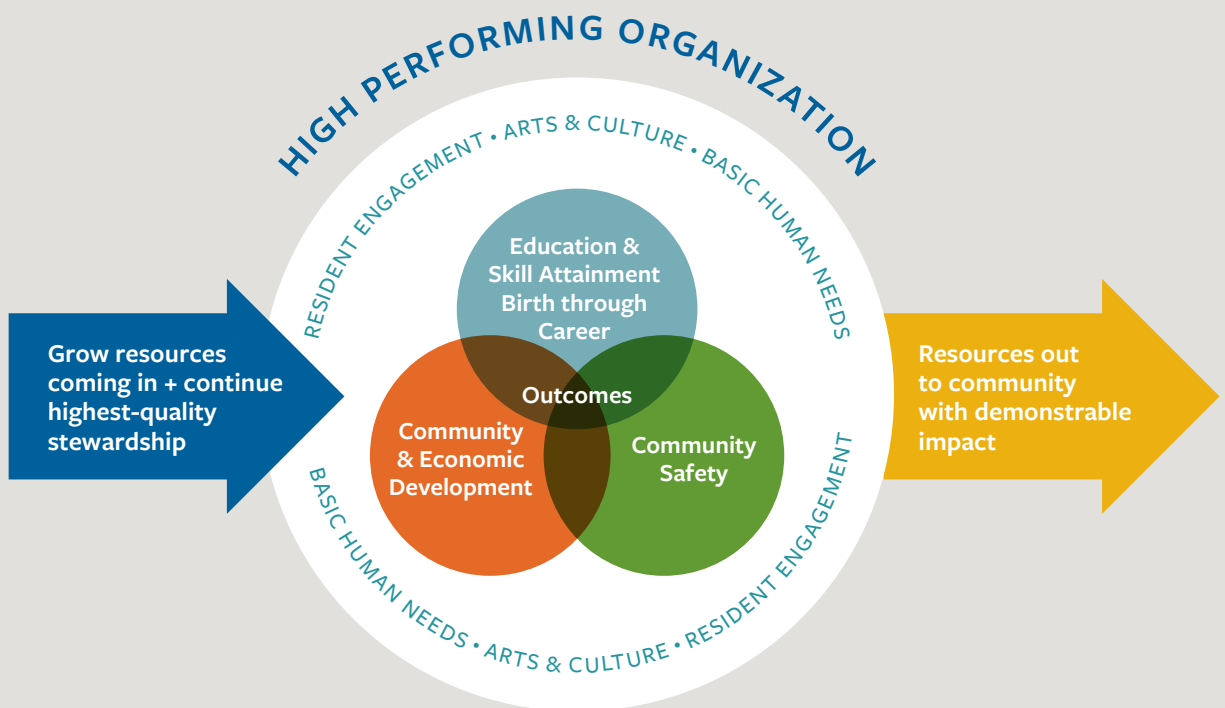
**9% of children born in the North End of Hartford are incarcerated as adults. It's less than 1% in Simsbury.**

## Addressing the disparities in our region is urgent work—and it demands both leadership and partnership to meet the challenge.

Increasing opportunities for all in Greater Hartford requires a coordinated, inclusive approach to philanthropy. As your community foundation, we have dedicated our experienced team to this work.



Using research, evaluation, and feedback from our partners, we have identified three primary focus areas for our work: Education and Skill Attainment (Birth through Career), Community and Economic Development, and Community Safety. We will continue to evaluate our progress to inform our efforts going forward and will partner with organizations that address basic human needs, support arts and culture, and encourage resident engagement. At the same time, we are investing in our internal capabilities to enhance the support we provide to our communities.

## Our Intended Outcomes

We are focused on working with community partners to contribute to five outcomes in the areas of **community and economic development**; **community safety** and **educational and skill attainment from birth through career**. These outcomes are:

Increased number of Hartford residents living in higher opportunity neighborhoods

Increased employment and wealth opportunities for Black and Latinx residents in the region



3

Decreased barriers to student progress for students in the region's highest-need districts



4

Increased community safety in Hartford



5

Decreased recidivism among residents returning to the region from incarceration





## We are collaborating to maximize our impact.



Our team approach will be informed by data, residents and nonprofit partners to indicate how we can allocate our resources in ways that are most impactful.

We will continue to promote ongoing learning, evaluation and sharing of information both within our organization and throughout the community. We will also employ two new tools to grow opportunity through inclusion:

### HFPG Impact! Greater Hartford

Our new subsidiary will promote transformative and inclusive community and economic development through a range of financial tools that complement traditional grants and extend their impact.

### Greater Together Community Funds

This effort will provide seed funding and training to support communities in taking ownership around needs in their towns, encourage inclusive civic engagement and anchor the Foundation in each of the 29 towns we serve.

## We are increasing the effectiveness of resources in our region.

Guided by the adverse effects of race / ethnicity, ZIP code and income on the distribution of disparities in Greater Hartford, we will:

- ▶ Increase our time in the community to listen and learn directly from the people and places impacted by our work.
- ▶ Prioritize our grantmaking, nonprofit capacity building programs and other activities in areas where we find the greatest disparities in outcomes based on race / ethnicity, place and income.
- ▶ Be more data-driven and outcome-focused than ever before. We will monitor and adjust our approaches as we learn, and share the challenges and progress broadly—in real-time—so we can co-create a vision for the region's future.

## We are expanding the reach of philanthropy to be more inclusive.

Honoring the intent of our donors, being responsive to a broad array of community needs and working collaboratively are cornerstones of the Hartford Foundation.

We are extending our reach to more donors than ever before, providing them with the ability to influence the change we all want to see in our community.

We are developing inclusive philanthropy to enable more opportunities for all, such as by lowering fund thresholds and adding new types of funds.

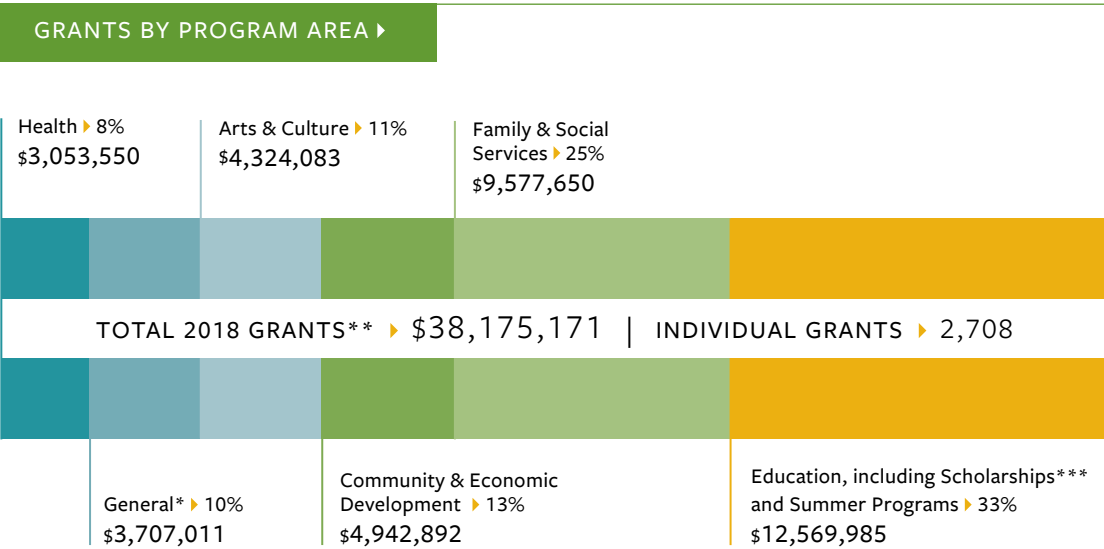

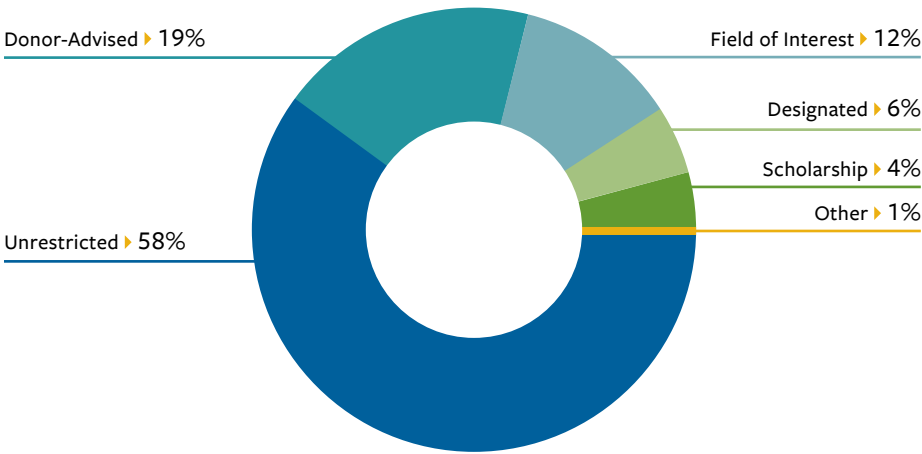

INVESTMENT RETURNS

The Hartford Foundation’s assets are managed by its corporate affiliate, HFPG, Inc. (the “Corporate Portfolio”) and by the Trustee Banks (the “Trust Portfolio”). Donor funds held by HFPG, Inc. are invested on a diversified basis with professional investment managers retained by the Foundation’s Investment Committee.

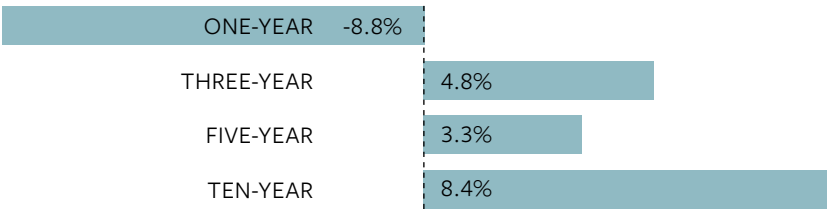
Bank of America, N.A. acts as the Trustee for the component trusts that are held in a common fund. (The other trustee bank is Key Bank.) The Trustee has sole authority to invest in a diversified portfolio with professional investment managers (which may include Bank of America, N.A. or its investment management affiliates, if any) chosen on a competitive basis. Both HFPG, Inc. and Bank of America use the services of a professional investment consultant.

(HFPG, Inc.)

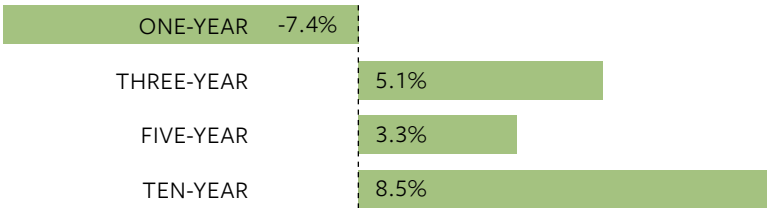

## FINANCE AND INVESTMENT

### How did the Hartford Foundation's investments perform in 2018?

Record highs achieved by the major US stock indices in the third quarter were followed by significant price declines in October and most acutely in December, resulting in negative results for the full year. Declines in international developed and emerging market equities occurred earlier in the year. Investment-grade fixed income, which began the year in decline, rallied as equities weakened to finish unchanged on the year. The Federal Reserve raised interest rates four times, resulting in a policy rate of 2.5% at the end of 2018. Investors became concerned that policy rate increases combined with efforts to reduce the size of the Federal Reserve balance sheet were happening too quickly and would hamper economic growth.

Against this backdrop, the Foundation's broadly diversified Corporate Portfolio posted an investment return of -8.8%, while the Trust Portfolio returned -7.4%, underperforming their customized target benchmarks by 1.3% and 1.6%, respectively.

### How does the investment performance help to provide grants to the community?

The Foundation's spending policy and investment strategy are designed to work together to provide a predictable stream of dollars for annual grantmaking to the region's nonprofits while also prioritizing the preservation of the inflation-adjusted value of the funds in the endowment so that the impact of future grantmaking can be as effective as it is today. We measure portfolio progress toward this goal by comparing it to the Consumer Price Index, a broad measure of inflation, plus 5%, the spending rate stipulated in our spending policy.

Since its inception in September of 1996, the Corporate Portfolio has returned an average 7.0% per year, net of investment management fees, while the Trust Portfolio returned 6.7%. The aforementioned Consumer Price Index plus 5% goal was 7.5% over the same timeframe. The sharp rise in the value of the portfolios' equity holdings during the beginning of 2019 has reduced this underperformance. The future direction of equity markets will have a significant influence on Corporate and Trust Portfolio returns.

## NEW FUNDS

The Hartford Foundation is proud to partner with the many individuals, families and organizations who created new funds in 2018.

### BARBOUR STREET RENAISSANCE FUND

#### *Donor-Advised Fund*

Hartford's Barbour Street runs from Keney Park in the North End to Capen Street in Clay Arsenal, and is home to the Hartford Circus Fire Memorial. It is now also the focus for a grassroots effort to achieve an economic, educational and societal revitalization similar to the Harlem Renaissance. A group led by Windsor native and funeral home proprietor Howard K. Hill, founder of The Prosperity Foundation Inc. Fund, and Marcus A. Brown, whose family barber shop is in its second generation, and others in the community started the Barbour Street Renaissance Fund to bring together concerned residents who want to pool their money to preserve Barbour Street's rich history. The fund empowers participants to be involved in their neighborhood while demonstrating the powerful difference active, local philanthropy can make in a community.



### GLADYS B. AND ROBERT E. DUNN FUND FOR FOODSHARE

#### *Designated Fund*

One in eight residents of Hartford and Tolland counties is food insecure, including 34,000 children. Before she passed away last fall, Gladys Dunn created The Gladys B. and Robert E. Dunn Fund for Foodshare to support Foodshare's mission: to "lead an informed, coordinated response to hunger in our community." The Duns have supported Foodshare for many years; Gladys and her late husband, Bob, were deeply committed to helping those in need. "We talked about [setting up this fund at the Foundation] a lot, and I think it was on our bucket list to do something aside from travel and the other funds we've established," she said. Foodshare is "well thought of and well managed," and is "very good at making sure that children have food for lunch in the summer and year-round."



## EHRE FUND

### *Donor-Advised Fund*

Ellen Ash Peters fled Nazi Germany with her parents when she was nine, immigrating to America. Education (she graduated cum laude from Yale Law School) brought her to Connecticut, where she became the first woman to gain tenure at Yale School of Law, followed by becoming the first woman Justice of the Connecticut Supreme Court, then Chief Justice. As Chief Justice, she authored the majority opinion in the landmark *Sheff v. O'Neill* education case. Now retired from the bench, she is an author and visiting professor at the UConn School of Law. Last year, she established the EHRE Fund—named for her parents, Ernst and Hildegard, her late sister, Renate, and herself—to support a variety of nonprofits in the Greater Hartford area, as advised by herself and her three children. The fund, whose name translates from German as “honor,” is her second at the Hartford Foundation. In 2003, she started the Dorothea Fund, which supports children’s rights and opportunities for disadvantaged children.



## THE EQUALITY FUND

### *Field of Interest Fund*

An anonymous donor created The Equality Fund to help organizations that support and empower individuals of diverse sexual orientations, gender identities and gender expressions to thrive in Greater Hartford. This fund supports direct assistance and services for individuals (youth through seniors) and families, targeting key areas such as basic human needs, education, elder services, health and employment, and programs that address challenges, disparities and barriers.



### HANDS ON HARTFORD

#### *Designated Fund*

Established in 1969 as Center City Churches, Hands On Hartford has served the Hartford community for 50 years. In celebration of its 50th anniversary, Hands on Hartford transferred a portion of its charitable funds to establish a non-profit endowment fund at the Hartford Foundation. The Fund ensures Hands on Hartford's mission of increasing food security and nutrition, improving health and providing safe, stable, affordable housing will be supported for generations to come. The agency has positively impacted tens of thousands of lives over the past five decades and is committed to the long-term sustainability of the vital services it provides to its Hartford neighbors.



### ILG FAMILY FUND

#### *Donor-Advised Fund*

A passion for serving the community spurred Albert and Jacqueline Ilg to set up their fund at the Hartford Foundation. During Al's 30 plus years as town manager of Windsor, and later as interim city manager of Hartford, both Al and Jackie have been committed to doing their part to make their community a better place for everyone. Through the Ilg Family Fund, they plan to improve life and provide opportunities for disadvantaged residents in Greater Hartford and beyond. In part, they hope their fund will be able to reduce inequities in living conditions in the region and around the world. By naming their daughters as their successor advisors, the Ilgs have ensured that their family will remain involved in Greater Hartford for decades to come.

### MANCHESTER AREA CONFERENCE OF CHURCHES ENDOWMENT FUND

#### *Designated Fund*

The 45-year-old Manchester Area Conference of Churches (“MACC” Charities) includes 37 member churches from a variety of denominations in the greater Manchester area. MACC covers community outreach and emergency services, including food, fuel and clothing, and works closely with the community to coordinate services and provide information and referrals to Manchester and Bolton residents. MACC’s endowment began with a legacy gift from Raymond “Sonny” Damato, a lifelong Manchester resident, landlord and entrepreneur known for his generosity through his church and as a sponsor of town events. “Through the fund,” said Beth Stafford, MACC’s executive director, “MACC can accept smaller gifts as well as gifts of stock and annuities, which ensures future sustainability. It’s opening so many doors to talk about MACC.”

### GIOCONDA B. McGETTIGAN FUND AND THE GIOCONDA B. McGETTIGAN FUND FOR ST. ROSE CHURCH

#### *Field of Interest Fund | Designated Fund*

Gioconda McGettigan, a Manchester native and East Hartford resident, passed away in 2016, but her legacy to the local communities she cared about lives on. A gift from the estate of Mrs. McGettigan created the Gioconda B. McGettigan Fund and the Gioconda B. McGettigan Fund for St. Rose Church. The former will support programs to benefit the citizens and communities of Manchester and East Hartford. The latter will support St. Rose Church in East Hartford. Mrs. McGettigan, who worked at G. Fox and Co., felt strongly about trying to improve local communities. Her generous bequest will enhance the quality of life for residents in East Hartford and Manchester.

### PEGGY MILLER COMMUNITY COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP FUND

#### *Community College Scholarship Fund*

Peggy Miller spent more than 20 years working in the New Britain public schools, so her appreciation for the value of an education is nothing new. More recently, she began to appreciate the value and benefit of our community colleges, which offer a more affordable option, the chance to gain academic confidence, and help students to find their life's direction. Discovering information about the Foundation's Community College Scholarship Program spurred Peggy to start the Peggy Miller Community College Scholarship Fund. Her dollars will be pooled with the Foundation's program, to help students "maximize their potential, whatever that potential may be."



### ROBERT J. PATTERSON SCHOLARSHIP FUND

#### *Individual Scholarship Fund*

Twenty years ago, a young Hartford resident graduated from Glastonbury High School and went on to pursue his undergraduate degree at Georgetown University, thanks in part to a scholarship he received from the Hartford Foundation. Today, Robert J. Patterson is chair of Georgetown's Department of African American Studies and a published author. Dr. Patterson established a scholarship fund at the Foundation to give back and help other students achieve their dreams. The scholarship is for a Hartford resident who intends to major in African American studies, the humanities and/or a social justice related field. Last year, Dr. Patterson came full circle, addressing the 2018 Foundation scholarship recipients at the annual reception, telling students and their families "... education affords us access to privileges and these privileges become ours, and our responsibility to share."

## PLAPLER MCMAHON FAMILY FUND

### *Donor-Advised Fund*

Dina Plapler and Earl McMahon have been involved as volunteers and supporters of many local non-profit organizations since moving to the Hartford area after meeting at Georgetown Law School. Earl has enjoyed a long career as a business attorney at the Hartford law firm of Reid and Riege. Dina has worked as a litigation attorney and, more recently, as the head of fund development at several leading non-profits, including: the Wadsworth Atheneum; the Hartford Stage; the Mark Twain House and Museum; and UConn Health. She currently leads the Advancement Department at Kingswood Oxford School. Dina and Earl are very grateful for the opportunity to give back to the community that has so enriched their lives, the lives of their two sons, David and Steven, and so many others.



## ROBBINS FAMILY FUND

### *Donor-Advised Fund*

City landscape architect Richard Robbins' work touched many aspects of outdoor life in Hartford—from war memorials to playscapes to the ponds in its parks. Through the donor-advised fund he established at the Hartford Foundation, Richard plans to build upon those efforts. While in the city's Parks Department, Richard wrote grant applications and received funding for Hartford from the Foundation, so he is intimately familiar with its work. Richard expects his love of the outdoors to play a role in his grantmaking decisions; he particularly likes the idea of encouraging children to be involved with nature studies and outdoor classrooms.







### CAROLINE AND JOHN ROHRBACH FUND

*Unrestricted Fund*

Caroline and John Rohrbach's interest in the Hartford Foundation reflects their longstanding commitment to participating in, and supporting, the Greater Hartford community. John served as chairman of the Hartford Rehabilitation Center and on the boards of the Protestant Campus Ministry, Alzheimer's Association / Connecticut and Literacy Volunteers of Greater Hartford. Caroline was a leader in the Connecticut Valley Garden Club and a strong supporter of the Knox Park Foundation's Hartford area greening programs. Both were committed members of the 1892 Club and the Asylum Hill Congregational Church, and supporters of the Hartford Symphony, the Hartford Stage and the Wadsworth Atheneum. They recognized the Foundation as an essential force for broader community giving, and their legacy gift was used to create an unrestricted fund that will support critical programs in the Greater Hartford region for years to come.

### ROSS MEMORIAL FUND

#### *Donor-Advised Fund*

Wethersfield resident Alice Gold has a number of connections to the Hartford Foundation, particularly through her work with the Hartford School Garden Council. Those ties, combined with her family's history of philanthropy, led her to create the Ross Memorial Fund at the Foundation to honor her parents, Barbara and Chester Ross. Her parents were very philanthropic and that, she says, is "a tradition that I like to carry on." She plans to focus her grantmaking on education, nutrition and environmental issues in Greater Hartford, with the goal of helping to find regional solutions. "The city and the suburbs do not exist in a vacuum," she said; "Improving the quality of life for the region helps everyone."





### ANN E. THOMAS AND MICHAEL B. BONZAGNI FUND

#### *Donor-Advised Fund*

Mike Bonzagni and Ann Thomas have been active members in the Catalyst Endowment Fund since 1998, and established an individual scholarship fund in 2016. Last year, they created the Ann E. Thomas and Michael B. Bonzagni Fund to help plan, manage and grow their charitable giving more efficiently and effectively. Their primary areas of interest include conservation and the environment, issues affecting women and girls, and the social services safety net.



### THE WINDING TRAILS ENDOWMENT FUND

#### *Designated Fund*

Connecticut families have enjoyed Winding Trails' 380 acres of woods and waterways in Farmington for more than 65 years for summer camp, educational wildlife programs and more. Long-time volunteer Arthur Curry, who set up the Winding Trails Endowment Fund, said, "I believe... in the environmental programs and the chance for kids to go to a place like this... it's just a wonderful recreation area for kids." The fund will support environmental programs and initiatives, capital projects like the new boathouse pavilion and camp scholarships in perpetuity.



### WORTHINGTON FAMILY FUND

#### *Donor-Advised Fund*

Andrew and Kathy Worthington have been part of the Hartford Foundation for 13 years. They are members of the Catalyst Endowment Fund, Latino Endowment Fund and the Black Giving Circle Fund. Andrew is a current Board member and chairs the Foundation's Development Committee. They learned about the pressing issues and needs in the Greater Hartford community, and became familiar with the people and agencies working to find solutions. The Worthington Family Fund continues their philanthropic journey. With their donor-advised fund, they will support the causes that are important to them, including animal-related causes that give a voice to the voiceless. The fund also allows them to strategically plan for their long-term future giving—for themselves, their children and beyond.

## TYPES OF FUNDS

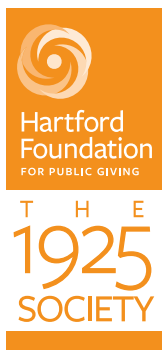
The Hartford Foundation for Public Giving offers a wide range of options for those who want to create or contribute to a fund. Donors can choose the type of fund that best suits their particular circumstances, goals for giving and desire for involvement.

---

- ▶ **Unrestricted Funds** address a broad range of local needs. Donors entrust the Foundation to use the fund's income for grants that respond to the community's changing needs.
  - ▶ **Field of Interest Funds** are designed by the donor to accomplish a broad charitable goal or purpose, such as improving health care, elementary education or the region's cultural life. Donors direct the Foundation to target funds to this topic or cause, focusing dollars on the most promising organizations working in the field at any given time.
  - ▶ **Donor-Advised Funds** are created by donors who wish to remain actively involved with grantmaking. Donors may recommend specific grants to their favorite charity; they may also consult with Foundation staff for guidance on effective grantmaking in their area(s) of interest.
  - ▶ **Designated Funds** are created by donors who wish to specify one or more organizations to receive all or a percentage of the income from the fund annually. The Foundation carries out the donor's directions, ensuring that the named agency receives the income to achieve its charitable purposes.
  - ▶ **Individual Scholarship Funds** are created by donors to help area students afford a college education. Donors can create a named fund with specific selection criteria and may participate in the selection process.
  - ▶ **The General Scholarship Endowment Fund** combines contributions, of any amount, and invests them in order to generate income that funds the Hartford Foundation's four-year scholarship program for high school students in the region. Cumulative donations of \$10,000 or more may be built up to establish a named award.
  - ▶ **The Community College Scholarship Fund** combines contributions of any amount and invests them to generate income that funds the Hartford Foundation's community college scholarship program for high school or GED program graduates in the region.

A \$10,000 minimum contribution is needed to establish any fund (except an Individual Scholarship Fund, which requires a \$50,000 contribution).

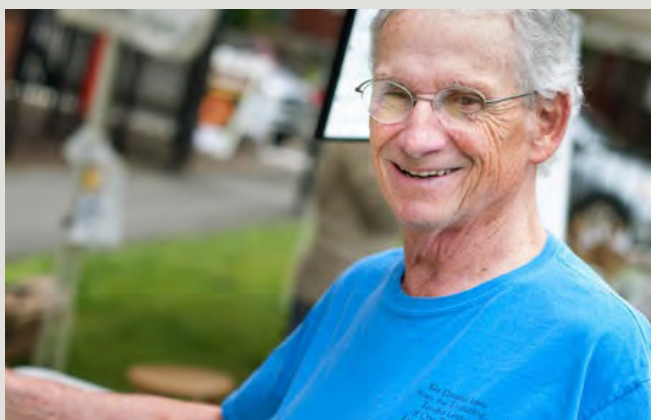
